



19. 600 (City of London) Squadron RAuxAF

The RAF Reserves work alongside regular RAF personnel in similar roles. Having been formed in 1925, 600 Squadron is the oldest Auxiliary Air Force Squadron. It is based at RAF Northolt, West London, and provides personnel across a wide range of RAF specialisations, including intelligence, HR, flight operations, communications, logistics, medical specialists and chaplaincy.



20. London Air Ambulance

London's Air Ambulance is the charity that runs the capital's helicopter emergency medical service. The service operates 24/7, using a helicopter and rapid-response cars, performing advanced medical interventions, normally only found in hospital emergency departments, in time critical, life-threatening situations. Missions commonly involve serious road-traffic collisions, falls from height, industrial accidents, assaults and injuries on the rail network.



21. Trinity College, Oxford

Founded in 1555, Trinity is one of Oxford University's best-known colleges. Its 300 undergraduates celebrate academic excellence, welcome diversity and regularly achieve success in music, drama and sport – including a rowing medallist at the London Olympics. The Lord Mayor, Roger Gifford, is a Trinity alumnus who studied Chemistry and rowed for the college.



22. Wings of Kilimanjaro

In early 2013, a group of paraglider pilots from around the world will climb and fly from Mt Kilimanjaro, the 'roof of Africa', to raise \$1m for three charities making a difference on the ground in Tanzania: Plant With Purpose, One Difference and WorldServe International. City of London Police Commissioner Adrian Leppard will be taking part and fundraising for the Lord Mayor's charities.



23. Air Training Corps Band

The RAF Cadets in this year's Lord Mayor's Show are from the London and South East Region (LASER) of the Air Cadets. Many of the young musicians of the band have learnt their skills from the adult volunteers of the RAF Air Cadets and will achieve their BTEC qualification in Music Services as a result of performing in public at the Lord Mayor's Show.



24. Air Training Corps

The RAF Air Cadets have been helping young people in the UK enjoy incredible new experiences and adventure training activities since 1941. With more than 40,000 members, aged from 13 to 20, the Air Cadets is the world's largest youth air-training organisation, supported by more than 10,000 adult volunteers.



25. Army Cadet Force (NE London)

The Army Cadet Force (ACF) is one of the UK's oldest, largest and most successful youth organisations. It consists of more than 47,000 cadets in 1,700 detachments across the country.



26. Army Cadet Force (SW London)

This helps young people between the ages of 12 and 18 develop both personally and physically by providing a range of opportunities, challenges and activities.



27. Volunteer Police Cadets

The Volunteer Police Cadets provides positive opportunities for young people. Cadets have the unique prospect of gaining an understanding of low-level policing and are able to make their local communities safer by supporting policing in crime-prevention initiatives. They also take part in summer camps and the Duke of Edinburgh Scheme, learn how to drill, steward events and receive training in leadership skills.



28. University of London Officers' Training Corps

The University Officers' Training Corps (UOTC) utilises military training to teach leadership skills. There are 13 UOTCs in England, four in Scotland and one each in Wales and Northern Ireland. The University of London Officers' Training Corps recruits from the university colleges across the capital and the South East of England.

29. National Youth Marching Band

The band includes members of the Redhill Corps of Drums & Band, Rubery Youth Marching Band, Moreton Boys & Girls Brigade Band, Halesowen Scout Band, Thurmaston Scout & Guide Band and Spen Valley Scout & Guide Band. It is led by Bandmaster Major David Edge and Senior Drum Major Dean Ongley of the Redhill Corps of Drums & Band.
