The late Master's Accounts with this Company for the  
 last year were audited and the several Vouchers  
 examined, and it appears thereby that he has received for  
 their use 26<sup>l</sup> 15<sup>s</sup> 6 and disbursed on their Account  
 23<sup>l</sup> 8<sup>s</sup> 11<sup>d</sup> 5 making a Balance of 23<sup>l</sup> 4<sup>s</sup> 1<sup>d</sup> due to the  
 Company; which was this day paid over by him to  
 Mr. Joseph Delafons the present Master.

The Clerk's Accounts for the same year were also  
 audited, and it appears thereby that he has paid  
 for their Use with his Fees and Salary the sum  
 of 35<sup>l</sup> 1<sup>s</sup> 8 and that he has received on their  
 Account 29<sup>l</sup> 10<sup>s</sup> 8 making a Balance of 5<sup>l</sup> 11<sup>s</sup> 0  
 due to him. Which the Master paid him accordingly.

Also the Beadle's Account for the same time was

The late Master reported to the Committee That

Canonbury House, And that he had discharged the  
Bill for the same amounting to <sup>£ s.</sup> 76. 1. 6 including the  
usual Gratuities to the Waiters.

The Committee then examined the list of the Yeomanry  
of this Company, and directed several of them  
to be written unto to take up their Livery at  
the next Court

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
