Act 1918

The following letter from the Secretary for the City of London was read:

April 15th 1918

Dear Sir

Representation of the People Act 1918

I beg to remind you that by virtue of Sect. 17 (1) of the above Act, a freeman of the City of London, being a Liveryman of one of the several companies who is entitled to be registered as a parliamentary elector in respect of a business premises qualification within the City, is entitled, if he thinks fit, to be entered in a separate list of Liverymen in the register of parliamentary electors, and to record his vote for Parliament as a Liveryman.
