Sixty Banquet  
The Master suggested that having regard to the length of the  
proceedings at the Sixty Banquet in recent years it might be advisable  
to distribute the Company's medals at a special prize giving to be  
held in the afternoon at which the Company's Scholars could perform  
and to which the whole of the Sixty with their Ladies might be  
invited and he asked the Court to appoint a small Committee to  
consider the matter. This was seconded by W. H. Settleton

Sir Frederick Bridge thought it would be a pity to alter the present arrangements but Sir Homewood Crawford supported the Master's view and after discussion the matter was referred to a Committee to consist of the following viz The Master Wardens Immediate Past Master Receiver Sir Frederick Bridge and Sir Homewood Crawford who were to report to the Court at their next meeting.

#### Master's Medal

The Master asked if it was the intention of the Court to discontinue the practice of presenting to the returning Master a small Silver Medal of the Company as used to be done before the institution of Badges and suggested that the custom should be revived and this was agreed to and the Clerk was instructed to obtain Silver Medals for such of the Past Masters as had not received them.

Mr Newellson A letter was read from Mess G E Headbeck thanking the Pulicworth D.P. 6/9/0 Court for their note of condolence.

A letter was also read from Mr John Headbeck (who was admitted to the Livery later in the evening) asking if the Court would accept a Silver Bowl which belonged to his Uncle the late Canon Duckworth to whom it had been given on his leaving St Marks Hamilton Square by W C D Hoblyn and his family.

The Clerk reported that by the instructions of the Master and Immediate Past Master he had written Mr Headbeck that he was sure the Bowl would be gratefully accepted and his action was cordially approved.

N.B. The Bowl was subsequently presented by Mr John Headbeck who was thanked by the Master for his kind and interesting gift.

Musical Honours The Treasurer Mr. J. C. Collard in pursuance of notice raised a strong objection to the singing of "He's a Jolly Good Fellow" at the Company's Banquets as being an undignified and vulgar proceeding and asked that some means might be taken to prevent a repetition of such so called "Musical honours". This was acceded by Mr. Lether and after discussion it was decided that it should be left to the Clerk to intimation to the Members of the Society who had been in the habit of singing such "musical honours" that the Court disapproved of the practice.

Samuel Sebastian Wesley Sir Frederick Bridge produced a drawing of the proposed Chapel of Samuel Sebastian Wesley and asked that the Company might indicate a movement to raise the necessary expense which amounted to about £100 and a Committee consisting of the Master Wardens Immediate Past Master Sir Frederick Bridge Sir Hamwood Crawford and Dr. T. S. Southgate were appointed to deal with the matter.

The Clerk was instructed to write to the new Dean of Westminster for his formal permission to the erection of the Chapel in Westminster Abbey and to ask what would be the amount of the future fee.

Purchase of Wine The Senior Warden questioned the advisability of stocking Wine as he thought it might be more economical to get the bakers to supply the Wine with the Dinners for an inclusive fee. The Treasurer was of opinion that the Company got better Wine and saved money through having its own cellar and after discussion the matter was decided to stand over for the Treasurer to report as to the consumption of wine used during the year when the next Annual Account was presented.

Livery Banquet The following report of the Committee was read

The Worshipful Company of Musicians

Report of the Committee appointed by the Court on the 23<sup>rd</sup> January 1912 to deal with proceedings at the Annual Livery Banquet

The members of the Committee beg to report that they are unanimously of opinion that the proceedings at the Livery Banquet have become too prolonged, they therefore recommend:

1. That the medal presented annually in relation to the Royal Academy, the Royal College of Music and the Guildhall School of Music be in future presented by the Master with a few words of congratulation and that no other speech or oration with this ceremony be made by any one else. The same remark applies to the medals presented to the Royal Naval School of Music and the Royal Military School of Music.
2. That in accordance with previous custom the music of the evening be entirely supplied by the London School of Music receiving the medal the programme of such music to be of short duration and not to exceed two items exclusive of 'God save the King' and that it will consequently be impossible to invite the students of the Royal Naval & Military Schools receiving medals to perform pieces after the presentation.
3. That the 'meous' be left to the discretion of the Master and avoided as much as possible.

4. That no band play during dinner

In view of the above recommendations the members of the Committee regard the discussion of a special Prize giving as superfluous being of opinion that the recipients would feel more honoured by receiving the medals from the hands of the Master at the Silver Banquet as hitherto customary than at a special function which would partake of the nature of a concert.

Report of the Committee appointed by the Court on the 23<sup>rd</sup> January 1912 to deal with the proposed auction of a Medallion of Samuel Sebastian Wesley in Westminster Abbey

Your Committee beg to report that having regard to the large fabric fee of £200 asked for the auction of a medallion to Samuel Sebastian Wesley in Westminster Abbey they cannot recommend the Court to proceed further with the matter as the amount of the fee makes it out of the question.

A letter was also read from Canon Pace suggesting that the Company might make a public appeal for small subscriptions from the Livery of England in order to raise the £350 required for the monument and fees but on the proposition of Mr. Littleton seconded by Mr. Ascher it was resolved that the idea should be dropped with regret Sir Frederick Bridge dissenting from the Resolution.

### Liverymen

Mr. Alderman Cooper raised the question of limiting the number of the Company's Liverymen which the Clerk stated would amount to 136 when the five new Liverymen had been admitted that evening. Alderman Cooper said that the Government looked with suspicion at the increase of freemen votes and moved that it was undesirable at the present time for the Livery to exceed 150. This was seconded by Sir Horace Crawford and carried unanimously.

The Clerk was instructed to report the death of any Member of the Livery at the next Court.

### Ernest Palmer Scholarships

The following recommendation was read:

In making arrangements for the Examination for the filling up of the two Palmer Scholarships which will shortly become vacant at the Guildhall School of Music it is pointed out by the Master that the usual procedure observed in such cases at the Royal Academy of Music and the Royal College of Music was for the School endowed with the Scholarship to appoint the Examiners to issue the necessary notices to invite the candidates to come forward to compete for the vacancies and in fact to make all arrangements.

It is obvious that any one of our great Schools for Music can make such announcements more effectively than our Guild being well in touch with the young people desirous of being educated as Musicians.

The Clerk therefore of our Company was instructed to approach Mr. Saxe Wyndham the Secretary of the Guildhall School of Music in order to ascertain of that School would in future send out the proper notices and bear all the incidental expenses incurred thereby. Mr. Saxe Wyndham agreed to all these conditions and said that the School would be quite prepared to undertake these duties in the above connection.

Only 5 candidates came forward on the last occasion when the Scholarship was thrown open.

We therefore recommend the Court to accept these arrangements with the following proviso - That the School be asked to submit for the approval of the Musicians Company the names of the proposed examiners of any candidate for the vacant scholarships at the Guildhall School of Music and that the Company be allowed to appoint one Examiner to whom the usual fee given in such cases shall be paid by the above mentioned Institution.

The question that had arisen with reference to the allocation of

The Palmer Scholarship to St Pauls and Westminster Abbey was discussed and a letter was read from the Revd Mr T R Stone-Haycock the Vicar of Westminster Abbey suggesting the advisability that the dates when the Scholarships would fall to St Pauls or Westminster Abbey should be made clear.


