Mr Hunter said he wished to know his present status having regard to his having acted as
the Mastership in October last Sir Homewood Crawford and the Clerk explained that he was
still eligible to be elected Master at any time but that he could not take precedence
of the members of the court who had passed the Chair

South London Mutual Relief

The Clerk reported that the sum of £5.5.0 voted by the court (and 29) had been sent

by the Committee of the South Devon Musical Festival to Church or Chapel Choruses of mixed voices not exceeding 40

Peoples Palace Musical Festival The Master reported that he had satisfied himself as to the desirability of the Company being connected with the Peoples Palace Musical Festival and a letter was read from Archibald Sinclair suggesting that the Special Prize of £5.5.0d be given by the Company should be allocated to a Male Voice Quartette with a minimum number of 12 voices and this suggestion was approved

Marching Song W. Hill reported that the Prize for the Marching Song had been won by Captain H. de Beury Shattock late R.A. of The Nest Salcombe South Devon and a letter of thanks from Captain Shattock for the Prize was read

The Clerk stated that he had obtained an Assignment of the copyright in the words from Captain Shattock to the Company and Mr Littleton explained the arrangement which he had made with Sir Edward Elgar to write the music by which arrangement the copyright in the music was to belong to the composer

See Frederick Bridge pointed out that it would be very ^{inconvenient} if the copyright in the words and music belonged to different owners and thought that the copyright in the music ought to be the property of the Company but after discussion it was decided that any arrangement made by Mr Littleton with Sir Edward Elgar must be respected and the question as to the copyright in the words which was vested in the Company was left over for further discussion

On the proposition of Mr Cooper seconded by W. Hunter a hearty vote of thanks was accorded to the Committee for their services on the matter

Treasurer The Treasurer presented his Accounts for 1907 which had been previously audited by the Accountants Messrs Shattock, Bowers & Cooper and a copy of which appears on the next page

The Treasurer explained that £300 cash had been deducted out of the £407.10.0 owing for fees and on the proposition of Sir Howard Cunliffe seconded by Frederick Bridge the accounts were passed and a hearty vote of thanks was given to the Treasurer for his services

Stationers Hall

A letter was read from the Clerk of the Stationers Company stating that his Court thought the annual payment made for the use of the Stationers Hall should be increased from 60 Guineas to 100 Guineas.

The Master stated that he and the Clerk had had an interview with Mr. Harrington on the subject and thought there was no doubt that if an offer to pay an annual sum of 80 Guineas were made it would be accepted upon the honorable understanding that the amount should not be further increased. Sir George Finsell said he did not agree with the action of the Stationers Company of the Court of which he was a Member and he advised that an offer of 80 Guineas should be made which he thought would probably be accepted.

Mr. Littleton as the President of the Livery Club stated that the Committee of that Club had passed a resolution to subscribe 10 Guineas for one year towards the payment of any extra amount but that the Club could not be bound beyond a year as they wished a free hand with regard to the place of holding their meetings.

Sir Horacewood Crawford proposed that the arrangement made by the Master with Mr. Harrington should be accepted. This was seconded by the Treasurer and carried and the Clerk was instructed to communicate with Mr. Harrington accordingly.

Sir Horacewood Crawford moved that the question of the livery taking part in the proposed London Pageant be referred to a committee for consideration and early report. He said he had communicated with Mr. Gomme the Chairman of the Historical section of the London Pageant and he read a letter from Dr. Cummings stating that he thought some interesting historical musical event could easily be produced.

The resolution was seconded by Mr Shillock and passed and the following Committee were appointed viz The Master Wardens Sir Frederick Budge Sir Horace Brasford Mr A H Littleton and Mr Clifford Badger with power to co-opt other Members of the Company

Ernest Palmer D. Nuttgate explained that after consultation with the Master Dr Cummings and Mr Ernest Palmer it had been arranged that those Scholarships which had been originally granted for a period of 2 years should be extended to the present Scholars for another year and this was approved

The Company A letter from Captain Sommer who had suggested the wearing of the Bridge Badge was read with reference to the manner in which it should be worn and the matter was referred to the Master and Wardens for consideration the Reverend H H Stadden undertaking to communicate with Captain Sommer on the subject

New Member Mr A H Littleton proposed that Mr Charles Harry Allen Hill of 5 Lincoln House Dartmouth Park Hill the Contractor of the Maconie Palace Chapel and Orchestral Society and other Societies be elected a Member of the Company Seconded by Mr J S Hall and carried unanimously

Carnegie Scholarships Letters of thanks from Miss Elizabeth Tuttell and Miss K Ethel Haman the late Carnegie Scholar were read and the following Report of the Examiner for the past Scholarships was also read -

Report on the Competition for the Musman's Company's Carnegie Scholarships

On Thursday the 10th instant in accordance with the Instruction given at the last Court we conducted at the Guildhall School of Music an examination of those who had entered for the Carnegie three years Scholarships of the Company

We are informed that in reply to the advertisement 110 forms of Particulars were sent out.

15 Candidates presented themselves viz 9 for singing in Pianoforte playing 4 in Singing and 2 for Violin.

Probably the high standard fixed and especially the requirement of Sight reading lessened the number of those who came up.

We are glad to report that the knowledge and proficiency shown were generally satisfactory. Ability to read fresh music at sight so essential a part of the test in the case of several of the Candidates was particularly good.

We recommend for the Scholarships:-

- (1) Miss Grace Emily Hawkins of Collier Clarendon Road Bradford aged 16
- (2) Master Lionel George Master of 2 Gordon Villas Headingley aged 16

Marching Song The Clerk reported that the music of the Marching Song had now been received from Sir Edward Elgar and that arrangements were being made to have the song performed by a picked Band from Kneller Hall at the next Court Dinner on the 28th instant

The Minutes relating to the Song were read as were also the words of the Song itself

Mr Littleton said that the only way to get Sir Edward Elgar to write the music for the Song was to let him have the benefit of the copyright in such music but Sir Frederick Bridge and Mr Collard were both of opinion that the Company ought to be entitled to some small profit out of the transaction either by way of royalty or otherwise. The Clerk reported that he had been in communication with Novello & Co Limited with reference to making some arrangements with regard to the copyright in the words and a letter from that firm to the Clerk dated the 11th February last now read of which the following is an extract

We are favoured with your letter of the 10th instant.
 We have carefully considered the matter of the words of the
 Marching Song which Captain Miller has written and which we
 understand is now the copyright of the Musicians Company. As the
 words of the Song have already been assigned to the Company we
 think the most satisfactory arrangement would be for the Musicians
 Company to retain the copyright and grant a license to publish the
 words with the Edward Elgar's music which will be our copyright.
 For such a license we shall be glad to pay the Musicians Company
 half the fee they have paid to Captain Miller for the entire
 copyright and we will if the Company approve publish the words for
 the Company according to them for the proceeds of sales less our
 usual commission.

Sir Frederick Bridge said he thought this arrangement would
 quite meet the case and on his proposition seconded by Mr Cooper
 it was unanimously resolved that such an arrangement be entered into
 and the Clerk was directed to act accordingly.

The Clerk was instructed to send Invitations for the next concert
 dinner on behalf of the Company to Captain W de Courcy Miller
 the Writer of the Song, and also to Miss N Kennedy Humphreys
 and W A Hoffmann who had acted on the Committee.

Sir Frederick Bridge stated that Dr Charles A C Harris was
 giving an Empire Day Concert at the Albert Hall on the 23rd
 May next at which he suggested the Marching Song should be
 performed for the first time in public and this suggestion was
 heartily approved.

The Clerk reported the death of Mr Robert Bonn Warick one of the oldest Members of the Court on the 5th March last after a long

Illness and stated that a memorial wreath had been sent in the name of the Company and a letter of thanks for the same from Mr J W Harrold was read.

A short discussion took place as to filling the vacancy on the Court caused by Mr Harrold's death and the Clerk was instructed to put the matter on the Agenda for the July Court.

The deaths were also reported of Mr George John Gadsden and Mr Joseph Edward Sheldell old Members of the Society.

Boblett Page Competition The Senior Harrold read the Report of the Second Boblett Page Competition as follows:

Report on the 'Phantastic' Competition 1908

The Committee appointed by the Court of the Musicians Company in April 1907 to conduct the Competition for The Boblett Phantastic Page No 2 as a short piece for Violin Violoncello and Piano forte have to report that Advertisements were duly inserted in the musical and other newspapers and steps were taken to make the scheme publicly known.

In response no fewer than 67 compositions were sent in by the close of the year 1907 and duly numbered.

The manuscripts were examined by Dr E Sharpey Sa and Mr Boblett and those which were obviously not worth further consideration were eliminated. About 50 were selected and revised for trial with the instruments. Mr Boblett had 15 meetings at his house trying all these works over with professional artists and reduced their number to 5 which were handed over to 'The London Six' to study for performance at the final trial before the judges, this took place on April 25th in the Principal Room of the Guildhall School of Music.

On hearing the 5 works it was unanimously agreed that the

First Prize of £50 should be assigned to a Student leaving the
metre 'Spice Meliora' (V 52) This was found to be by Mr Frank
Bridge of 50 Elm Park Mansions Chelsea a former Scholar of the Royal
College of Music and who has already won one of the Musicians
Company's Composition Prizes and has had a Symphonic Poem played
at the Queen's Hall Symphony Concert.

This work is a fine piece of dramatic instrumental music boldly
conceived brilliant in effect and quick up to the highest type of instru-
mental musicianship. It is laid out in the manner prescribed in the conditions.

The Second Prize of £10 presented by Mr H. L. Shirley was
assigned to a Mr L. S. composition with the motto 'Visits' (V 26)
This proved to be by Mr James Fisher of 45 New Street.

Pellockshields Glasgow a former Student of the Royal College of
Music who obtained the Medal of the Company in 1906 and
has also won one of the former Phantasie Prizes.

He has furnished an imaginative work, melodic, containing much
fugue-like thought and directly conducted.

The Third Prize of £10 also presented by Mr Shirley was
assigned for a piece bearing the motto 'Sub Umbra' (V 11) This was
found to be by Mr John Island of 54 Elm Park Mansions Chelsea.
Mr Island obtained a Composition scholarship at the Royal College
of Music and holds the diploma of Associate of the College and is
a Fellow of the Royal College of Organists.

This work is a well-built pleasing composition and displays
effective treatment of the instruments employed.

For the additional Prizes compositions labelled respectively
'Under the light there is darkness' (V 58) and 'Habemus misericordiam'

of sans perdue courage' (No 16) were chosen as worthy of special recognition.

The first of these was found to be by Miss Alice Butt, Verso of 25
Clarendon Grove, S. Kensington.

The second was by Miss Jessie Spain - Rank an Associate and
Scholar of the Royal Academy of Music of Mr. Merton ^{various} Lucas
and Gardiner W. Kensington and a former Student of the Royal Academy
of Music.

The Committee recommends that extra additional Prizes of £5 each
be granted to these two ladies.

Captain A. J. Beaumont has furnished further funds and expressed
the desire that Mr. Bellott should distribute 5 small supplementary prizes
of Two Guineas each to Composers of works chosen by him.

In accordance with the promise made by Captain Beaumont who
has generously presented a special sum of £50 the Committee now proposes
to proceed to the publication of the 3 works chosen.

It is suggested that arrangements should be made to have the
Prize Compositions played before the Court of the Company on some early
convenient occasion.

The Senior Warden proposed that the Report should be adopted.
This was seconded by Mr. Cooper and carried unanimously and the Clerk
was directed to enter it on the Minutes.

The Company's Badge A letter from Captain Chamberlain as to the manner of wearing the Badge
(ante page 112) was read and after discussion it was decided that
the Members of the Society should continue to wear the Badge pinned
to the left breast as hitherto. The question as to whether the front
Badge should be worn suspended close to the collar or 3 inches below the
collar was discussed and was adjourned to the next Court.

South LondonMusical Festival

The Clerk reported that the Prize given by the Company for the South London Musical Festival had been won by the Streatham Congregational Church Choir and a letter from Mr T Lester joins the Secretary of the Festival acknowledging receipt of the cheque for the Prize was read.

Concert of EarlyEnglish and French Music

The Clerk reported that the Master had given a concert of Early English and French Music with dances at Silvers' Hall on the 27th January last which had been much appreciated by the large company present and on the proposition of Mr Cooper seconded by Mr Shattock a hearty vote of thanks was accorded to the Master for his generosity in the interests of the Company.

Invitation toCanada

A letter was read from Dr Charles J E Hauss a Lucyman of the Company inviting the Court to accompany the Shoffield Choir on its coming visit to Canada in October next and giving full details of the interesting programme of functions and concerts proposed for the visit but as none of the Members of the Court could conveniently attend it was on the proposition of the Master seconded by the Senior Warden decided that Dr Hauss should be thanked for his kind invitation and should be informed that the Court regretted their inability to accept it.

London Pageant

Sir Hemswell Bradford reported that the proposed London Pageant had been postponed to 1909.

Company who required assistance and said he would bring forward a Motion to this effect at a suitable opportunity and the Master said such a Motion would have his cordial support.

Royal Military School of Music The Senior Warden stated that Colonel Shaw Hillier a Member of the Court who annually gave a Prize of £5.5.0 to be competed for by the Students at the Royal Military School of Music. Mr. Hillier wished the Company to accept a sufficient sum of money upon trust to provide such a Prize with the necessary additional fees for a Judge of the same in perpetuity and that if the Company would accept such a trust he would have a proper legal document prepared.

On the proposition of the Master seconded by Almanian Sir George Wyall Russell it was unanimously resolved to accept Colonel Shaw Hillier's offer with thanks and the Senior Warden undertook to communicate with him on the subject.

Scholarship Conditions The Senior Warden stated that it was becoming an objectionable habit of unscrupulous persons to invite Students who had obtained Scholarships to perform at Concerts and suggested that the Students ought not to be allowed to perform at such Concerts without the consent of the Principal of the School to which they belonged. Sir Homewood Crawford pointed out that a new condition to the holding of the present Scholarships could not now be imposed but that a condition could be inserted in future Scholarship Regulations that the Company's Scholars should not appear in public without the previous consent of the Principal of the School to which they were attached. This was accordingly moved by the Senior Warden and seconded by Sir Homewood

The Treasurer suggested that it might be as well not to fill the vacancy at present on account of the state of the Company's finances but after discussion the Master proposed that Mrs A. Spelman brief J.P. who was a Nephew of the late Mrs R. B. Warwick should be elected an Assitant. This was seconded by Mrs Hoblyn and carried unanimously

C.V.O the Director of the Royal College of Music and Sir Walter Parratt M.V.C the Master of the Kings Musick and said he would personally defray any expenses in connection with such presentations.

Mr Edgar suggested that the Freedom should be presented to these 3 gentlemen as individuals in recognition of their services to Music and not by virtue of their positions so as to create a precedent and this view was accepted. The resolution was seconded by Mr Holley and carried unanimously.

Benevolent Fund In accordance with notice Mr Ascher proposed that a Benevolent Fund of the Musicians Company be established with a view to creating a

fund which might be available to help all Musicians whether they were Members of the Company or not.

Sir Frederick Budge pointed out that the Royal Society of Musicians had large funds to help Musicians generally and he did not think any part of the proposed fund should be available for assisting persons other than those connected with the company. The Master was also of this opinion and said he was quite prepared to concur and after further discussion on the proposition of Mr Edgar seconded by Mr Hunter it was unanimously resolved that a Committee be appointed to consider the advisability of forming a Benevolent Fund And on the proposition of Sir Frederick Budge seconded by Mr Hunter it was resolved that the Committee should consist of the Master and Wardens Sir Frederick Budge the Treasurer (Mr J C Collard), Sir Hemwood Crawford and Messrs A H Shattock A J Hill and C B Edgar.

Mr Hill stated that he had received a letter from Mr J Head Falconer a Liveryman of the Company enclosing a cheque for £21 as a contribution towards the proposed fund and it was arranged that Mr Hill should hold the money for the present.

The Members met in the Lord Mayor's Vestry and proceeded in Procession to the West Door to meet the Lord Mayor and Sheriff subsequently proceeding in Procession to the choir where Hails were reserved for them

After the same the Preacher preceded the Lord Mayor and Sheriff in the same order to the West Door and after their departure returned to the Lord Mayor's Vestry

A beautifully worked Banner of St. Cædla presented by Mr W H Ash J P the President of the Livery Club was used for the first time and carried at the head of the Procession the Company's other Banner being carried in its usual place

A Processional Hymn "As the World turneth from Evening to Morning" written for the occasion by the Reverend Bernard Reynolds M.A. Prelate of St. Paul's and the Music for which had been composed by Sir George C. Martin M.V.C. Mus. Doc. a Member of the Company was sung for the first time and the Music with the exception of the last Hymn was by Dr John Blow (1649-1708) in commemoration of the Bi-Centenary of his death

The Livery Club of the Company held a Banquet at Stationers Hall in the evening the Chair being taken by Mr W H Ash J P the President of the Club at which the Lord Mayor and Sheriff the Archdeacon of London, Canon Newbold and several other of the cathedral Clergy and Officials were present and special music suitable for the occasion was given
