Class 7 - "The Musicians Company" Competition for Church or Chapel Choirs (Mixed Voices). Choirs of not more than 40 voices.

Test Pieces: 1 Anthem, "Blessed are they that dwell in thy house", by Berthold Tours. No 309 "Musical Times" (Novello & Co Ltd).

2 Hymn, "Behold the Lamb", No 3 of 6 Hymns, by G. F. Huntley (Novello & Co Ltd). The composer gives permission to translate into Ionic Sol-fa for purposes of this competition.

Sections of Church Choirs may enter for Classes 4, 5, 11 and 12.

Adjudicator - Dr Wm Phillips. Entrance Fee 7s 6d.

Prize. A Challenge Shield given by The Worshipful Company of Musicians. To be held by the Prize-winners for one year and to be returned to the Secretary of the Festival one week before the 1913 Festival. Winners will be expected to insure the shield against Fire and Burglary and to accept liability for any damage to the trophy whilst in the Holders' possession and until returned.

In proposing the adoption of the Accounts the Master made certain suggestions which he thought would make the Accounts clearer with which the Treasurer concurred and on the proposition of the Master seconded by Mr. & D. Hoblyn the Accounts were adopted and passed and a cordial vote of thanks was unanimously passed to the Treasurer for his services

Trust funds The Master suggested the advisability of keeping the Trust Accounts in future quite distinct from the general Funds and proposed the appointment of a small Committee to consist of the Master, Wardens, Treasurer, Mr Alderman and Sheriff Cooper (as one of the Trustees) and Sir Homewood Crawford to consider the matter

This was seconded by Captain Chamier and unanimously adopted. The Treasurer said that if any further Trust funds were given to the Company he thought such funds ought to be endowed with the necessary amount to meet the expenses of carrying out the trust and this was unanimously agreed to.

Memorial Window
in Londonderry
Guildhall

A letter was read from Sir Alfred J Newton a Governor of The Irish Society to Mr Alderman and Sheriff Cooper enquiring if the Company would be willing to fill in with stained glass a vacant Window in Londonderry Guildhall at a cost of £35 in memory of their association with the Fishmongers' Company in the Plantation of Ulster in 1613.

Mr Alderman and Sheriff Cooper produced a sketch of the proposed window he had obtained and said he would be willing to contribute £5 towards the cost and the Master, Treasurer and Sir George W Truscott also stated their willingness to contribute similar amounts. After discussion it was pointed out that the Members of the Company generally might like to be associated with the gift and on the proposition of Mr Alderman and Sheriff Cooper seconded by Sir George W Truscott it was unanimously resolved that an appeal should be made to the Livery for subscriptions to be limited to 5/- and the Clerk was instructed to write to Sir Alfred J Newton stating that the Court would guarantee £35 to meet the cost of the window and requesting him to have the work get on with.

The correspondence that had taken place between the Clerk and Mr. Wynndham the Secretary of the Guildhall School of Music with reference to the advertisements announcing the Carnegie Scholarship and the small number competing was read and Sir Frederick Bridge stated that having regard to the result being so unsatisfactory he considered that the recommendation approved by the Court in April last (see ante page 211) ought to be rescinded and he gave notice that at the next Court he would call attention to such Regulations and move a resolution.

After considerable discussion it was resolved to hold a special Court to consider the matter on ~~Wednesday~~^{Fri} the 25th February next and on the suggestion of Mr. Hill the Clerk was instructed to get out a return of the numbers of Candidates presenting themselves at the various examinations and the amount of fees paid and also to let every Member of the Court have a copy of the Recommendation.

A letter was read from the Rev. N. M. Morgan Brown stating that the Authorities at St. Paul's would be prepared with one or more Candidates for the vacant Ernest Palmer Scholarship the Examination for which was to be held in

The Master proposed that Mr Alfred John Cope of The Old House Ewell Surrey be elected a Member of the Company. Seconded by Mr A. Graft and carried unanimously.

Mr A. F. Hill proposed that Mr Felix Victor Schuster of 79 Elm Park Gardens S.W. be elected a Member of the Company. Seconded by the Master and carried unanimously.

The Master proposed that Mr Waldorf Astor M.P. of Cliveden Taplow Bucks and 4 St James Square S.W. be elected a Member of the Company. Seconded by Mr A. F. Hill (who pointed out that Mr Astor's ancestor George Astor described as the son of Jacob Astor of Mannheim in Germany was admitted to the Freedom of the Company by redemption on the 28th December 1796) and carried unanimously.

Ernest Palmer Scholarships
The Master having stated that he had seen M^r Saxe Wyndham who admitted that mistakes had been made in connection with the recent Examination for the vacant Carnegie Scholarship and a letter from M^r Saxe Wyndham explaining his letter to the Clerk of the 15th January last and stating that such letter was written hurriedly and not intended as an official communication, having been read by Sir Frederick Bridge in pursuance of notice moved:-

That the Resolution of the court committing the management of the Scholarships to the Guildhall School of Music Authorities be rescinded. And that the original plan of having these Examinations conducted by a Committee named by the court be again reverted to.

This was seconded by M^r Lescher

Sir Homewood Crawford considered it was premature to alter the arrangement

which had been confirmed by the Corporation without giving the Guildhall School of Music a further trial and he pointed out that the Members of the Court were in the position of Trustees and not therefore entitled to take fees for Examinations as had been done in the past. He accordingly moved the previous question by way of amendment.

The Senior Warden in seconding Sir Bromwood Crawford's amendment said the Court would be stultifying itself if they rescinded the Resolution come to on the 23rd April last and after discussion Sir Frederick Bridge replied repeating that a mistake had been made but he admitted that if such mistake had not been made the question would not have arisen.

The Amendment having been put, 9 voted for it and 4 against and the Amendment was accordingly declared by the Master to have been carried.

The Master said that there was a strong feeling that if a further bungle was made by the Guildhall School of Music the matter should be reconsidered and this was cordially acquiesced in.

D^r J. Lea Southgate in pursuance of notice moved:-

- (1) That the Authorities at the Guildhall School of Music be requested to inform the Clerk why the Regulations dealing with the Musicians' Company Scholarships - drawn up by a Special Committee as settled by the Court - were not adhered to at the recent competition.

And why the term 'absurd' was applied to some of the conditions by the Secretary of the School.

- (2) Why the Scholarship was restricted to Pianists.
- (3) Why the notification Advertisement did not appear in 'Musical News' until the issue of Saturday November 30th the Applications having to be sent in by the next working day December 2nd 1912.

He pointed out that although the names of Messrs Septimus Webb and Claude

Golland had been submitted to the court and approved by the Master and Wardens as the examiners for the recent Carnegie Scholarship jointly with M^r Stanley Hawley, the actual examiners were Messrs Arthur Newstead and Wellington Leslie which he considered a very improper proceeding.

Sir Almonwood Bradford quite agreed as to the impropriety of altering the examiners without the consent of the court and said that if D^r Southgate would agree to strike out the second paragraph of (1) and the whole of (3) he would second the Resolution with an additional enquiry why the examiners had been changed. D^r Southgate assented to this and the following resolutions were accordingly put and carried unanimously

- (1) That the Authorities of the Guildhall School of Music be requested to inform the Burk why the Regulations dealing with the Musicians' Company's Scholarships - drawn up by a Special Committee as settled by the court - were not adhered to at the recent competition
- (2) Why the Scholarship was restricted to Pianists ; and
- (3) Why the examiners were changed without previous notification to and without the sanction of the court

and the Burk was directed to send a copy of such resolutions to the Secretary of the Guildhall School of Music

The question as to the Regulations for the Scholarships was shortly discussed and it was decided to refer the matter to a Committee to consist of the Master Wardens D^r Southgate and M^r Littleton to settle the form of Regulations and to bring them up for the approval of the court at their next Meeting on the 22nd April.

It was also decided that the next Examination for the Ernest Palmer Scholarship must be postponed until after the Regulations had been approved by the court

A letter was read from the Rev^d F. M. Morgan Drew suggesting the desirability

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of increasing the value of the Ernest Palmer Scholarship so as to enable Boys from the Provinces whose Parents could not afford to keep them in London to accept them and the Clerk was instructed to reply that the Company were not in a position to augment the Scholarship and to express the hope that the Authorities at St Pauls would have one or more well qualified Boys ready to compete at the next Examination also to point out that Ex-Choristers were eligible.

St Pauls

A letter was read from the Rev J. Childs-Clark the Succentor of St Pauls stating that the Dean and Chapter had decided to allot 6 Tickets to the Company for each of the great Musical Services at St Pauls viz -

1. The Special Advent Service held always on the first Tuesday in December at 7 p.m.
2. The Feast of the Conversion of St Paul on the 25th January at 4 p.m.
3. Bach's Passion Music (St Matthew) held on the Tuesday in Holy Week at 7 p.m.

The Clerk stated that he had already written to Mr Childs-Clark thanking him for his communication and he was instructed to formally convey the thanks of the Court to the Dean and Chapter of St Pauls for their kind action in the matter.

The question of the distribution of the tickets was discussed and it was decided that a ticket should be offered in the first place to the Master and Wardens and that the Master should ballot for the distribution of the other tickets among the other Members of the Court and that any tickets not made use of should be at his disposal.

The Minutes and Proceedings of the court held on the 21st January last and of the Special court held on the 25th February last were read and confirmed.

W. Henry Cook The Clerk reported the death of W. Henry Cook f.P. an old Liverman of the Company on the 5th February last and also of W. Hermann Louis Sternberg another Liverman of the company on the 16th March last.

Apprentices The Clerk reported the Apprenticing of Geoffrey Hawkes formerly of Clifton College to his Father W. Oliver Hawkes a Liverman of the Company for 4 years and of Ralph Hawkes of Clifton College to his Father W. Oliver Hawkes for 7 years.

The Clerk stated that on referring to Bylaw 15 it appeared that no Member of the Company who had not served the office of Warden could take more than

one Apprentice at the same time and it was therefore arranged in order to put the matter right that one of Mr Hawkes' Sons should be transferred to the Master.

The Master suggested that only Apprentices who were Sons of Liverymen of the company and therefore entitled by patrimony should in future be admitted to the Livery on payment of the reduced fine of £25 and that all others should pay the full fine. This was seconded by Mr Alderman and Sheriff Cooper and carried unanimously.

Memorial Window in Londonderry Guildhall

A letter was read from Sir Alfred J. Newton thanking the Company for their resolution of the 21st January last and the Clerk reported that he had received subscriptions from Members of the Company amounting to £24.

towards the cost of the Window.

The Master, Alderman & Sheriff Cooper, and Alderman Sir George Wyatt Truscott expressed their willingness to make up the difference but the Clerk was instructed to send a reminder to Members of the Court who had forgotten to subscribe before closing the List.

Election of Master and Wardens

In pursuance of notice Captain Chamier again brought forward his Motion for the election of the Master and Wardens at the July Court but stated that the Clerk had referred him to the Charter and Bye Laws which required the Master and Wardens to be elected within twenty days after the Feast of St Michael the Archangel and had suggested that the best way out of the difficulty would be to have a Special Court within twenty days of Michaelmas Day at which the Master and Wardens for the ensuing year could be elected and any special business transacted so as to leave more time at the Court usually held before the Livery Dinner for necessary formal business.

This suggestion was approved and the Master having seconded Captain

Chamier's resolution it was unanimously resolved that in future a special court should be held annually within 20 days of the Feast of St. Michael the Archangel for the purpose of electing the Master and Wardens and transacting any pending business and that the Master and Wardens should be admitted at a Quarterly Court to be held at the end of October when other formal necessary business could be transacted.

The following report of the Finance Committee was read -

At a Meeting of the Committee held on the 9th April 1913 it was unanimously resolved to make the following recommendations to the Board.

- (1) That the £1250 presented by Mr Ernest Palmer to found the Scholarships bearing his name which is now represented in the Company's Books by £1000 being an undivided portion of £1187 10/- paid on the 27th September 1905 for the purchase of a Ground Rent of £47 10/- per annum secured on Nos 12 to 28 (even numbers) Norlington Road Leytonstone and £263 10/- Metropolitan Water 13 3 per cent Stock purchased on the 8th May 1906 for £250 cash, should be invested in the Company's name in some specific but separate investment and expressly allocated in the Company's Books for the purposes of the said trust.
- (2) That the United States Steel Corporation 5 per cent 50 year Gold Bonds for \$5000 presented to the Company by Mr Andrew Carnegie to found the Carnegie Scholarships and which Bond is now in the keeping of the London County and Westminster Bank, Berners Street Branch, for safe custody the Coupons being collected by the Bank, be retained and that the whole of the dividends be applied for the benefit of this particular trust.

The desirability of converting this Bond into registered Stock was considered by the Committee and although it has been ascertained that the Bonds could be converted into registered Bonds by being sent to New York, if this were done it might probably be an expensive proceeding, and the advantage now possessed through the present series of Bonds being redeemable by annual drawings beginning this year at 10 per cent premium would be lost. It would therefore seem better to allow the present Bonds to remain in the custody of the Bank as heretofore without any change.

- (3) That the £143 5 9 - Metropolitan Water 13 3 per cent Stock presented through

Mr A J Hill to found the Leo Stern Memorial Scholarship on the 30th April 1907 be allocated or represented by a separate sum of Stock or otherwise earmarked and that the whole of the dividends receivable from this Stock be carried to the credit of this particular trust.

- (4) That the £113 12-8 Metropolitan Water B 3 per cent Stock presented by Mr Hugh Wyatt, the dividends from which were to cover the cost of the Annual Medal presented for competition by the Royal Naval School of Music be similarly dealt with.
- (5) That all the Trust Accounts be kept separate and distinct from the Company's general funds and from each other.
- (6) That proper Ledger Accounts in respect of each Trust Account be opened and kept.
- (7) That the investment in Metropolitan Water B 3 per cent Stock now standing in the names of the three Trustees be transferred into the Company's own name as a corporate Body and that the Trustees be released from all further liability.
- (8) That all moneys payable to the Company should pass through the Treasurer's Account and the necessary Cheques be drawn on such Account for all outgoings. The Clerk to keep a Ledger with such accounts as may be deemed necessary to be posted up from the Treasurer's Cash Book.
- (9) That an Audit Committee to consist of the Master and Wardens for the time being be appointed; part of whose duties shall be to annually check the Company's title deeds, plate and other property and to present a report to the Court in January of each year.

Report of the Committee appointed by the Court on the 22nd April 1913 with regard to Miss Alice Prendergast's Trust for apprenticing Choir Boys.

Your Committee met on the 7th May 1913 when Mr Arthur F. Hill explained the object of the Trust and the Clerk was instructed to write and inform Miss Alice Prendergast that the Company gratefully accepted the trust of £500 for the

purposes named, and that a scheme for working the trust would be drawn up and submitted for her approval. Mr Hill undertook to communicate with Members of the Company connected with Music Trades with reference to such scheme and to report to the Committee at another meeting.

A further Meeting of the Committee was held on the 10th July 1913 when the Clerk reported that he had had an interview with Miss Prendergast's representative, Mr Hayter who said Miss Prendergast was quite willing to hand over £500 to the Company upon a Declaration of Trust being executed to apply the income of the money upon such terms as might be specified in a Scheme to be approved by Mr Hill, and further that Miss Prendergast would pay all legal charges in connection with the matter.

Mr Hill reported that he had communicated with several Members of the Company connected with Music Trades who had expressed their willingness to accept Apprentices. Mr Hill explained in some detail the Scheme he had prepared by which it was proposed to confine the benefits of the Trust to Choir Boys of Church of England Parish Churches within the area of the City of London as controlled by the City Corporation, with the exception of St Paul's Cathedral, the boys to be nominated by the Vicars or Clerks of such Parish Churches who would be applied to in turn taken in alphabetical order according to the name of the church as listed in the City of London Year Book and Civic Directory published by W H & L Collingridge.

The Scheme was fully discussed and a few suggestions made and it was unanimously resolved to recommend that such Scheme should be adopted and that the Clerk should be instructed to have the necessary legal document prepared to carry the Scheme into effect.

Mr John Bellard, Mr Alfred H. Littleton, Mr William Boosey on behalf of Messrs Chappell & Co, Mr Oliver Hawkes on behalf of Messrs Hawkes, Mr W. St Leslie on behalf of Messrs Broadwood & Sons, and Mr A. G. Mason on behalf of the Orchestrille Co.

The object of this Scheme is to help an ordinary choir-boy of the church of England, the son of poor working parents, who may be content to remain a journeyman worker but through having been apprenticed to a trade, is more likely to be sure of gaining a livelihood.

The choir-boy is to be drawn from one of the Parish Churches within the area of the City of London controlled by the Corporation. It is proposed to obtain such apprentices by addressing a circular stating the object of the Fund etc., to the vicar or the rector, as the case may be of the Parish, and the opportunity for recommending an apprentice is to be offered in turn to each of the Parish Churches of the City of London (with the exception of St Paul's Cathedral), and in order to avoid confusion, these Parish Churches shall be placed in alphabetical order on a list. One boy only at a time to be accepted from each Church.

It is proposed to get into touch with such boys by means of a circular addressed to the clergymen of the parishes in question asking them if they have any choir-boy who would care to avail himself of the opportunity and

in the affirmative case, requesting them to furnish particulars with regard to his training and education.

This Scheme is to be called "The Prendergast Apprenticeship Fund" founded in memory of A. H. D. Prendergast, Hon. Freeman of our Company and the income of the sum of £500 (as the funds may permit) is to be applied to paying the premium for apprenticesing one or more City of London choir-boys of a Parish Church of the Church of England, with the exception of St. Paul's Cathedral, to some trade connected with music.

The interest of the Fund may be allowed to accumulate for two years, if needs be, to pay a higher premium which may be demanded by some particular trade.

X Failing the carrying out of this Scheme the income of this endowment is to be applied to another purpose, namely, to be presented annually to the Principal of the Royal Academy of Music to be devoted by him to assist some poor student in the study of music at his Institution.

Old Book of
English Music

By request of the Master Dr. J. Lea Southgate made a statement respecting a remarkable volume of manuscript music about to be presented to the British Museum and showed the book. This consisted of a translation he had made from the old Tablature into modern notation of some 215 pieces by various English composers. The music was written for the Viola da Gamba and put together about the year 1670 for some player on that instrument. Dr. Southgate edited the music there set out and added a Preface, with Notes on the Composers.

The original volume belonged to the Corporation of Manchester where Librarian had requested him to undertake the task. It had been proposed that a copy of the translation of this interesting music should be given by the Court of the Company to the British Museum, But Mr. Edward Cooper desired to bear the expense of this, and to present the volume himself.

Mr. Southgate said he was convinced that no other such collection of early string music existed anywhere else. The Trustees of the British Museum had expressed their thankfulness for the proposed gift, and he was sure that Students of music would rejoice at being afforded the opportunity of examining

and making practical use of the re-discovered music.

Sir Edward Cooper said that he was glad to avail himself of the opportunity of giving a transcript of the book to the national library; and that the company was in a measure identified with this, as the inscription placed inside mentioned his name as a Past-Master of the Musicians Company.

Sir Frederick Bridge declared that the value of this hitherto unknown English music could not be overestimated; he himself had already made use of some of the tunes in it, and he was thankful that a copy had been placed in the British Museum.

The Master said he considered that the Court should express their appreciation of the service rendered to English Music by the laborious and erudite work of Dr Southgate - one of their Past-Masters - in this matter and their satisfaction that another Past-Master, Sir Edward Cooper, had been instrumental in providing a copy for the Museum.

It was resolved accordingly.

The Clerk reported that he had only one or two copies left of the Company's Handbook which was usually given to new Liverymen and he was instructed to put the matter on the Agenda for the next Court.
