It was decided to hold the Examination for Girls as soon as possible and the Senior Warden instructed to make the necessary arrangements.

The Treasurer explained the accounts and pointed out that considerable expenditure had been accounted on account of the exceptional year but notwithstanding this £100 had been invested.

On the proposition of the Master seconded by the Deputy Master the accounts were adopted and a hearty vote of thanks was given to the Treasurer for his services.

Company's Finances The Junior Warden suggested that as the company's expenditure on account of its many necessary outlays was largely increasing it might be desirable to increase the fee by charging a small fine on taking the office of Master or Warden. Sir Hemwood Crawford supported this view and it was unanimously resolved that the matter should be referred to a Committee to consist of the Master, Deputy Master, the Wardens, the Treasurer, the Senior Past-Master, Sir Patrick Bridge and Sir Hemwood Crawford to consider the matter and report to the Court.

Incorporated Society of Musicians A letter from the Secretary of the Incorporated Society of Musicians asking whether the Company would appoint a representative to form one of a delegation to the Minister of Education with reference to the registration of qualified teachers of music was considered. Mr Cooper read a letter which he had received from Mr Kunciman the Minister of Education on the subject and expressed the hope that the Master would consent to go as the representative of the Company in his dual capacity of Lord Mayor and Master. Sir Hemwood Crawford suggested that the Senior Warden be added so that he might go in case the Master's engagements prevented him from attending.

The Deputy Master explained the circumstances under which it was proposed Sir Alexander Mackenzie an Honorary Freeman of the Company should attend at Vienna in May next to preside at the International Conference on Music and stated that he thought it would be very advisable if Sir Alexander could attend as the representative and at the expense of the Company which the Deputy Master was willing to defray. Mr Littleton pointed out certain difficulties but said that Sir Alexander could certainly attend the Haydn's Commemoration that was to be held during the conference as the representative of the Company and after discussion it was resolved

That the Court of the Musicians Company has heard with great satisfaction that Sir Alexander Mackenzie one of its Honorary Freeman is to preside at the International Conference on Music to be held at Vienna in May next and begs to offer him its congratulations on the honorable position conferred upon him and requests him to be good enough to act as the representative of the Company at the forthcoming Haydn commemoration

The Committee appointed at that Court drew up an advertisement which duly appeared in the Musical and other newspapers setting forth the conditions and prizes offered. Paragraphs concerning the scheme were likewise sent out to the daily press and in "Musical News" appeared articles giving special information respecting the type of musical composition to those intending to enter.

Sgt. Dr. Albert Williams Bandmaster of the Grenadier Guards one of those named by the Court as "Assistants in judging" was good enough to deliver a Lecture illustrated by his Band on "Military Music Scoring" at the Royal College of Music by permission of Sir Hubert Parry. This was largely attended and it is believed that it has been of much assistance to the composers.

At the expiration of the time allotted for the work to be done it was found that 113 manuscripts had been sent in some coming from Canada and parts of the Empire as distant as India & Burma. As yet these pieces have been looked and only glanced through to see that they complied with the conditions set out.

Mr. Frederick Bridge has asked for the Committee to be called together on May 3rd to settle the mode of procedure and arrange for the due examination of the pieces sent in. It is proposed to form a Sub Committee of 6 members to undertake this work in the first instance and then to report to the General Committee.

In support of the scheme I have saved up to the present time £67.8.6 Of this £56.5.0 represents the Special Prize money

we offer Mr. Palmer's 50 Guineas is not yet to hand. The Prize money has been paid to and is held by the Treasurer charges for advertisements postage printing of Regulations etc amounting at present to £5. 18. 1 have been paid. This leaves in hand a balance of £25. 5. 5 towards the expenses of publication etc. More will certainly be required but further sums have been ^{promised} forwarded and it is hoped that sufficient will be received to carry through the scheme successfully.

In considering the extensive examination work that has to be done it is desirable to give the Committee power to increase the Committee by putting some more professional members of the Company on that body. Perhaps some one will move that this be done.

Bust The Senior Warden called attention to the fact that the Glanville Gillies Bust in Westminster Abbey presented by W. A. S. Piers had no inscription identifying it with the Company and it was arranged that Canon Duckworth should be approached with reference to the matter.

Parkers Pension Corporation A letter was read from the Board of Governors of the Parkers Pension Corporation of which the Master was Honorary Treasurer asking for a donation and on the proposition of the Treasurer seconded by Sir Hemmant Crawford it was resolved to subscribe 10 Guineas to the Fund for which the Master thanked the Court.

Music Loan Exhibition Mr. A. H. Littleton presented the Court with a copy of the Illustrated Catalogue of the Music Loan Exhibition and made the following remarks which the Clerk was directed to put on the Minutes.

My Lord Mayor

It gives me the greatest possible pleasure to lay before you as Worshipful Master of the Musicians Company the first complete copy of the Illustrated Catalogue of the Exhibition organised and held by the Company in 1904.

The time occupied in producing this Catalogue must appear to you all extraordinarily long. I can only excuse this by saying that the production of the work at all has been most extraordinarily difficult.

The Worshipful Master could tell you that the mere material result which you see on the table requires a very large amount of labour trouble and expense.

But this material part is not equal to one tenth of the expenditure of time and thought in preparing and putting together the contents of the volume.

The difficulties in obtaining accuracy in a catalogue of this kind can only be appreciated by those who have had experience of similar work.

How far we have succeeded in securing any thing like accuracy we shall probably very soon learn from our kind friends the critics both public and private.

We have to acknowledge with many thanks very valuable help from Members of the Society, from Members of this Court and more than all from my friend Mr Arthur Hill. The volume must now speak for itself and should it be the means of adding a further to the honour and glory of the Worshipful Company of Musicians those concerned in its production will feel themselves amply repaid.

Mr W C Haining who was Master of the Company in 1904 when the Exhibition was held said he would like to present the Company with another copy which could be suitably bound and kept at Stationers Hall for inspection and he was thanked for his gift.

The Committee appointed by the Special Court on October 11th 1908 to deal with the Military Band pieces competition has to report that 2 meetings have been held

At the first of these May 3/09 held at the house of Mr Frederick Bridge a Sub Committee consisting of Mr Frederick Bridge P G J Bennett D E Markham Mr W C H Allan Gill D W H Cummings & P J Sir Autygate was appointed to deal in the first instance with the Manuscripts sent in. The principles and standard on which pieces were to be selected for a final performance were discussed and settled. The members of the Sub Committee were requested to undertake this examination task and report which in their opinion were the 12 best pieces submitted.

The Senior Warden reported that 119 manuscripts had been sent in comprising 30 Overtures 40 Marches 23 Suites 11 Fantasies and 15 works in other forms.

The M S S were subsequently gone through by the members of the Sub Committee notes made as to each piece offered and 12 were selected to compete for the Prizes.

The rejected compositions were returned to their several writers together with a letter of thanks and regret that they could not be

included in the trial performance.

The small envelopes of the composers of the 12 pieces selected were opened by the Clerk and they were each asked to furnish a set of Part for performance. Four of these replied that they had not sufficient time to copy out these and could not afford to give the task to a copyist.

After consultation it was deemed advisable that the expense should be borne by the funds subscribed for the competition generally.

The pieces are now nearly all ready for trial.

A second meeting of the Committee was held at the Mansion House June 28th 109

The Report of the Trial Committee as to the progress made was read and accepted. It was decided that the scores should go to the 2 military corps named Captain A. J. Sheller of Kneller Hall and Mr Dan Godfrey Conductor of the Bournemouth Orchestra so that they might become acquainted with the pieces selected and make any notes they thought proper in advance of the performance for judging the 5 Prizes.

At this meeting Lieut. Dr Albert Williams attended and undertook to study the 12 selected pieces have trial performances of them which the Committee could attend, and finally to produce them with the Guards Band. The offer was accepted and Dr Williams was thanked for his valuable help.

This has been carried up to the present time in respect to the Prizes and variations towards the expenses a sum of £89. 10. 6

Inspite of the amount set aside for the Prizes after account we find there is in hand a balance of £

It should be borne in mind that besides any present to the Band for the final performance of the works when the Prizes are to be determined the publication of the compositions will have to be arranged for.

On the proposition of Mr J H Shilcock seconded by Mr Sixter the Amici Musicae and the Committee were thanked for their services.

Imperial Music College Trust The Clerk reported the receipt of a letter from H R H Prince Christian asking for a donation towards the Imperial Music College Trust and stated that the Deputy Master Mr Clegg had made a donation of £25 on behalf of the Company and Mr Clegg was thanked for his further liberality.

South London A letter was read from Mr J Lester Jones asking the Company to give Wood Island another Prize of £5 at the 1910 Festival and on the proposition of Sir Frederick Bridge seconded by Sir Horace Wood it was decided to give a Prize of £5 on the understanding that it was in no way to be treated as a precedent.

Company's Silver Medal It was resolved that the Company's Silver Medal for the present year should be bestowed upon Miss Ellen Constance Edwards Pianist the Student of the Royal College of Music recommended by Mr C Hubert Parry the Director.

Fourth Musical Competition

The Committee appointed by the Court to deal with the schools

of a competition for new pieces of music written by native composers for a full military band present their Final Report.

It has already been stated in an interim report that in response to the advertisements issued 119 pieces were sent in. We now know that many of these came from young composers most of whom had never before essayed this type of composition as well as from Army Band masters and Conductors. The pieces were sent from parts of the Empire as far distant as Burma India South Africa Canada and Malta. This much is mentioned to show the great interest taken in the scheme and how widely the conditions of the competition have been circulated.

The Sub Committee of Experts went through the works and eventually selected 20 for further examination. These were then reduced to 12. The scores and the 'parts' (which had to be provided) were delivered to Capt. Albert Williams M.V.C. Mus. Doc. for study & practice by the band of the Grenadier Guards. Dr Williams most generously placed his valuable services at our disposal. At the last of the rehearsals held at which most of the Committee attended it was determined to reduce the number of the pieces to be further studied and presented to the judges to 7 those being deemed by far the most worthy to compete for the Prizes offered.

The final testing took place at The Queen's Westminister Volunteer Hall Buckingham Gate on Wednesday morning Oct 15th. Sixteen of the Members of the Committee including the Military Music Experts were present and were furnished with voting papers provided with the usual divisions for judging the several features of such music. The Master attended and formally expressed the thanks of the Company to Dr Williams and his Band for the time and great pains they had

taken to study and produce this new music. At the close of the performance Sir Frederick Bridge again thanked the players and pointed out the import of this novel competition and the desire of the Musicians' Company to help British music in every way.

The Banquet was held in the Egyptian Hall at the Mansion House

at which 181 sat down and during the evening the New Master and Wardens were sworn in before the Livery with the following ceremony:-

The Clerk having assumed his Gown proceeded to the Masters Chair with the Oath and Admission Book the Wardens Elect at the same time proceeding to the Masters Chair unobed the Beadle and 2 others bringing up the Masters and Wardens Gowns
