ARTHUR BULGIN MEDAL

An over-view by Liveryman Jill White.

Liveryman Wing Commander Arthur F. Bulgin endowed this annual award in 1954 to be offered to a member of the National Youth Orchestra of Great Britain, on the nomination of its Director. Since then, there have been 43 recipients nominated by the four Directors of Music: Dame Ruth Railton (the Founder of the NYO); Ivey Dickson OBE; Dr Derek Bourgeois and myself, since 1994.

In 1966 and 1969 the Medal was not awarded, just in case someone thinks I can't count!

Of the 43 Medallists it is quite astonishing many have made a hugely successful career in music, but the NYO does not only offer the award to players who are determined to make the muse their profession. For example, I awarded the medal to the clarinettist, Andrew Russell in 1995, knowing that his ambition was to become a paediatrician. (A Liveryman of our Company does not have to be a musician - there are similarities between the two philosophies). Nevertheless, his contribution to the NYO was of the highest order - distinguished both musically and socially - a model for others in every way.

It is, therefore more than likely that some of the names unknown to me on this impressive award list may have chosen careers other than music. Having experienced the professionalism of the orchestra, which has traditionally recognised that excellence is achieved by a focused mind and hard work, every NYO'er knows how to transfer these skills to all other disciplines. I am confident that all the Bulgin Medallists will have distinguished themselves in their chosen field, whatever their profession.

When Dame Ruth had the idea for the NYO, more than 50 years ago, though still only a young woman in her 20s, she was well aware of the joy of discipline and the enormity of God's creation! What is life if the soul is not fed with great music, art, or philosophy? What is life if we do not seek to be wise? These are mega-challenges of course, a lifetime is not long enough, but there is never any boredom! Is it not more fun to travel than arrive?

Liverymen have had the opportunity to hear one of the recent Medallists the harpist Catrin Finch who has played a couple of times at Livery Dinners. However, without wishing any offence to those names not included, I would like to mention a few of the Bulgin

performance of English song. I was a member of the winning ensemble of the prestigious Croft Sherry Prize for Early Music in 1997, which was adjudicated by James Bowman and Andrew Parrott. Early music has become my specialism; I also won the other two remaining prizes available for performance of Early Music: the Helen Eames prize for Early Music Singing and the Hilda Anderson Dean prize for solo recital of music before 1750 (vocal or instrumental).

Choral singing also played a major part in my Academy life. As a member of the Academy Chamber Choir, I twice visited Neresheim Abbey in Germany for a week which culminated in a concert for a capacity audience of 1500. However, the most memorable occasion of my time at the Academy was a concert given by the Academy Sinfonia and Chorus at the Royal Festival Hall, The concert was in memory of Princess Diana, in the presence of Her Majesty the Queen and featured a number of famous soloists, conducted by Sir Colin Davis, Broadcast live on Radio 3, it was an all Mozart programme, (Mozart being Princess Diana's favourite composer), and ended with a most moving performance of Mozart's Requiem.
