The Clerk reported that he had received 370 compositions for the Grace Prize Competition and that the Prize of £10:10/- had been awarded to Charles Wood Esq. M.A. Mus. Doc. of Gonville and Caius College Cambridge, and that an additional Prize of £5:5/- had, through the liberality of the Senior Warden, been awarded to Arthur Henry Brown Esq. of Brentwood, Essex, and on the proposition of M^{rs} J. L. Southgate seconded by Sir Homewood Crawford it was unanimously resolved that a hearty vote of thanks be accorded to the Senior Warden for his further liberality

The Clerk also reported an offer he had received from Mettler & Co^o Limited (the publishers of the Coronation Prize March) to pay £15:15:0 for Assignments of the copyrights of the two Graces with a royalty of 3^d per copy on each Grace sold after the first one thousand copies had been sold (all copies being calculated 13 as 12 on account of the allowance to the trade) and the royalty account to be forwarded every half year in January and July, and on the proposition of Sir Frederick Bridge seconded by M^{rs} Southgate it was resolved to accept the offer, and the Clerk was to write Mettler & Co^o L^{td} accordingly
