The Report being considered in detail, the Chairman explained the steps he had taken to secure the loan of a suitable Livery Hall, and the difficulty encountered in endeavouring to obtain one for a period of 21 days during the Summer of 1904. Several Halls visited were unsuitable for want of light, and not one had yet been found where pictures would be permitted to be hung on the walls. It was resolved to appoint the following as a special Deputation to visit and report upon a suitable Hall. The Master, The Chairman of the Committee, Sir Frederick Bridge, Sir George Martin, Mr. E. Cooper and Mr. A. F. Hill. The Report of the Sub-committee having been adopted for recommendation to your Honorable Court, the following additional suggestions were made:— that early Church Music as well as Madrigals should be sought after, that His Majesty, the King, be asked to honor the Company by exhibiting the Company's Gold Medal presented to him when Prince of Wales and some of the valuable Manuscripts, together with Handel's harpsicord, now at Buckingham Palace, that Messrs Willis & Walker and Mr. A. F. Hill
