The correspondence that had taken place between the Clerk and M<sup>r</sup> Saxe Wyndham the Secretary of the Guildhall School of Music with reference to the advertisements announcing the Carnegie Scholarship and the small number competing was read and Sir Frederick Bridge stated that having regard to the result being so unsatisfactory he considered that the recommendation approved by the Court in April last (see ante page 211) ought to be rescinded and he gave notice that at the next Court he would call attention to such Regulations and move a resolution.

After considerable discussion it was resolved to hold a special Court to consider the matter on ~~Wednesday~~<sup>Tuesday</sup> the 25<sup>th</sup> February next and on the suggestion of M<sup>r</sup> Hill the Clerk was instructed to get out a return of the numbers of Candidates presenting themselves at the various Examinations and the amount of fees paid and also to let every Member of the Court have a copy of the Recommendation.
