

The music was admirably rendered. The Times, Morning Post, Standard, Daily Telegraph and other weekly Newspapers gave a good account of the performance, eulogised the scheme of the Company to help British Military Music and pointed out to our young Composers the value of this new field of work.

Invitations to the performance were specially sent to those Publishers who issue this type of Music. Offers for the Prize pieces have since been received from three of these Publishers.

The Committee appointed by the Court to deal with the matter will meet in about a fortnight's time and it is hoped to settle the conditions and effect a sale of the compositions so that they may soon be ready for issue.

The Master has received in subscriptions towards the scheme £102. 2. 6. There has been expended for Prizes copying parts, advertising postage printing carriage of music and various expenses,

The Clerk reported that the copyrights in the 5 successful pieces had been duly assigned to the Company.

Mr Loeb's Prize - A letter was read from Mr Sydney J. Loeb a Liveryman of the Company offering a Prize of £10 for Solo Singing. Doubt was expressed as to the advisability or feasibility of such a Prize but the matter was referred to a Committee to consist of the Master Wardens Sir Frederick Bridge Mr G. S. D. Crews, Sir Honnewood Crawford, Colonel T. B. Shaw Heller and Mr G. B. Edgar.
