The Account of the late Master, Mr. Simpson,  
was audited and found correct leaving a balance  
due to him of £36.1.9.

The Treasurer's Account was examined,  
by which it appeared, he had a balance  
in hand of £186.15.0.

The Clerk's Account leaving a balance  
due to him of £3.5.0 was found correct.

The Beadle's Account was examined, by  
which it appeared he had received for Quarterages,  
£6.2.0 - his Commission on the same being £1.4.0  
he paid into the Master's hands £4.18.0.

The Stamp Book was then compared  
with the Commissions of Freeman, and found to  
be correct.
