An application from Thomas Dupon (who took up his Freedom of the Company in 1738 by apprenticeship to M^r. Joseph Williamson) was read and on the proposition of the Master seconded by M^r. W. M. Wilkinson it was resolved that £3:3:0 should be given him as a donation.
