**71. One New Change**

Designed by legendary architect Jean Nouvel, One New Change is the City of London's iconic shopping and leisure destination that opened in October 2010. Boasting more than 60 stores, it offers unforgettable retail and restaurant experiences night and day, seven days a week. It also has a stunning roof terrace overlooking St Paul's Cathedral, restaurants from Jamie Oliver and Gordon Ramsay, and shops including Topshop and Hugo Boss.



**72. Metropolitan Grand Lodge of London**

London Freemasons are honoured and proud to support the Lord Mayor's Show again, and for the first time since 1937 they will all be participating wearing their full regalia. Charity is at the heart of all Freemasonry and London Freemasons have given more than £5m to local charities in the past 25 years, especially to London children's charities.



**73. 71 (City of London) Yeomanry Signal Regiment**

Formed in 1969, the regiment has a proud heritage dating as far back as 1584. Today, it provides military command and control capability in support of UK operations. With squadrons based in Bexleyheath, Lincoln's Inn and Uxbridge, the regiment is today represented by the riding

detachment of their Lincoln's Inn-based squadron – 68 (Inns of Court & City and Essex Yeomanry) Signal Squadron.



**74. The Band of The Royal Yeomanry (Inns of Court & City Yeomanry)**

Formed in 1961, the band can trace its history back to 1548 with the raising of the Inns of Court Regiment. Following amalgamation with The City of London Yeomanry and further re-organisation of the Territorial Army in 1967, the band became that of the Royal Yeomanry, but maintained its distinctive ceremonial uniform.



**75. Royal Yeomanry**

The Royal Yeomanry is London's only TA cavalry unit, with squadrons in Croydon, Fulham and the City. It also has squadrons in Swindon, Leicester and Nottingham. It supports the regular armoured reconnaissance regiments, operating on foot and from vehicles, specialising in detecting chemical and radiological threats. The regiment has deployed several hundred soldiers on operations in Iraq and Afghanistan.



**76. 3 Military Intelligence Battalion (V)**

London's TA intelligence battalion, based in Hackney and Hampstead, delivers intelligence support to operations. Today it shows aspects of its soldiers both in their imagery-analysis role and their civilian day jobs. Also on the float are students from academies in Hackney and the battalion's affiliated Livery Company, the Worshipful Company of Painter Stainers.



**77. CCA Art Bus**

The CCA Art Bus is a mobile work of art and art gallery designed by Sir Peter Blake. Created to be a rock 'n' roll tour bus for art and artists, it visits schools, communities, festivals, galleries and art events. [www.ccagalleries.com](http://www.ccagalleries.com)
