The score bears the inscription 'Simplex Munditus' and is Bridge's earliest surviving work for large orchestra. The competition was won, in January 1902, by Percy Godfrey. In the trio section Bridge quotes from the National Anthem.

The score is enclosed in an envelope (post-marked 1 May 1911) in which it was returned to Bridge after the adjudication. In the end no prize was awarded; hence his inscription, added in blue pencil on the envelope: 'Coronation March (damn!!!)'.
