The Silver Medal of the company with Miniature Medal was presented to Mr Charles Ernest Rube by the Master at the Dinner held after the Meeting of the Court and Mr Rube then handed over the Loving Cup presented by him to the custody of the Company.

On Thursday the 12th February 1903 a Deputation consisting of F. Harwood Lester Esq. Master, W. C. Herring Esq. Senior Warden, C. J. D. Crans Esq. Junior Warden, and accompanied by the Clerk, attended at York House, St James' Palace when the Master presented His Royal Highness, the Prince of Wales, with a Cheque for £866.2.0 being a contribution from the Company to King Edward's Hospital Fund derived from the sale of the "Coronation Prize March," and the Senior Warden presented His Royal Highness with a copy of the March appropriately bound.

The following are extracts of the proceedings from the "Times" and the "Daily Express" of the 13th February 1903.

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FOR THE KING'S FUND.

£3,000 FOR CORONATION PRIZE MARCH AND CONCERT.

THE PRINCE'S PLEASURE.

A little service of great interest was performed at York House yesterday morning, when the Prince of Wales received a deputation from the Worshipful Company of Musicians.

The object of the deputation was to present to His Royal Highness a cheque for £866.2s., the result of the wonderful sale of the "Coronation Prize March," composed by Mr. Percy Godfrey, which was played before the public during the Coronation season by the "Express," at the Albert Hall on June 13, will ever forget the wonderful effect produced by the playing of the march by such names as:

In particular distinguished pleasure that the Prince of Wales received the cheque from the hands of the Master of the Worshipful Company of Musicians, Mr. Frank Harwood Lester.

The deputation, consisting of four gentlemen—Mr. F. Harwood Lester, the Master; Mr. W. C. Herring, the senior warden; Mr. C. T. Daniel Crans, the junior warden; and Mr. T. Collingwood Penwick, clerk—arrived at York House shortly before one o'clock, and were received by the Prince of Wales by Sir William Gurnett.

His Royal Highness, who was in morning dress, mutually shook hands with each member of the deputation, and the proceedings were over.

Mr. Lester, Master of the company, gave His Royal Highness a brief history of the Company of Musicians, whose charter dated from the time of King Edward IV.

"The Queen," he said, "was composed by Mr. Percy Godfrey, who was successful in gaining the prize offered by the company for the best march among his competitors."

The march, he said, helped the company. "Many houses, I am told, immediately paid the sale. Then the 'Express' graded the sale of the march throughout all over the world."


Mr. Lester added that the "Prize March" was sold. The June Committee, of which the march was one of the chief attractions, produced over £2,000, and he had great pleasure in presenting the cheque for £866.2s. as a result of the sale of the march.

The senior warden—Mr. Herring—presented to the Prince a copy of the march bound in white watered silk, with his Royal Coat of Arms.

The Prince of Wales, in his reply, expressed his satisfaction at the success of some of the march sold, and warmly thanked the company for the large sum of money, which would do much good to the poor.

His Excellency had always been attached to music, and he was present at the grand opening of the Albert Hall, and much enjoyed

Sir Hemswell Bradford read the Report of their Committee appointed at the last Court which is as follows: -

To The Worshipful Master, Wardens, and Court of Assistants
of the Worshipful Company of Musicians

Gentlemen,

At a Court Meeting held on the 20th January last it was unanimously resolved, on the Motion of Sir Hemswell Bradford, that to celebrate the 500th Anniversary of the Company's Incorporation by Royal Charter an exhibition of Musical Instruments and Manuscripts be held under the auspices of the Company in the year 1914 and that it be referred to a Committee of no less than seven Members, with power to add to their number, to make the necessary arrangements. It was further resolved that the Master, Wardens, Sir Frederick Bridge, Mr John Clemente Collard, Mr Edward James Cooper and Sir Hemswell Bradford form the Committee, and have power to co-opt additional Members from the Livery.

The Committee held their first meeting on the 5th February last when

Sir Homewood Crawford was unanimously elected Chairman, and the following Members were co-opted from the Livery - Mr Thomas Lea Shugate, Mr Arthur Frederick Hill, Mr Charles Bonar Rudge, Sir George Clement Martin and Mr John Fred Randall Stainer. The offer of the De Jager Royal Hotel Company Limited Victoria Embankment to afford the Committee accommodation for their meetings gratuitously was accepted. The Committee proceeded to consider various matters in connection with the exhibition, and resolved to recommend that the same should be held, if possible in the City of London, at one of the Livery Halls, and should remain open for at least 21 days. Further that steps should forthwith be taken to secure Royal Patronage, and that a Guarantee Fund be opened to meet the expenses connected with the exhibition. The Chairman intimated as the result of his experience of previous exhibitions that about £1000 would be required.

At a Meeting held on the 13th of February, Mr A F Hill and Mr J F S Stainer consented to act as joint Secretary and were so appointed, and the following additional Members were added to the Committee - Mr Alfred George Littleton, Mr Clifford Blackett Major, Sir Ernest Clarke and Mr Thomas Bellingham Littleton. It was resolved to request the Master to be good enough to place a sum of £150 out of the general funds of the Company at the disposal of the Committee for initial expenses - and the following subscriptions to the Guarantee Fund were announced - The Master Mr Frank Haward Lester £25, the Senior Warden Mr William Kirby Young £21, the Junior Warden Mr Charles Thomas Daniel £20, Mr John Clements Willard £21, Mr Edward Ernest Major £21, Sir Frederick Bridge £21 and Sir Homewood Crawford £50. The Chairman was authorized to address a circular letter to other Members of the Livery and to the Livery, inviting them to join the Fund.

The following sub-committee were then appointed to draw up a Scheme and make suggestions as to the form of the proposed exhibition - Sir Frederick Budge, Sir George Martin, Mr. Southgate, Mr. Littleton, Mr. Edgar, and the Honorary Secretaries.

The Committee held a further Meeting on the 31st March last, when the Chairman announced that he had received favorable replies to his several applications for Royal Patronage, and that His Majesty, the King, Her Majesty, Queen Alexandra, and Their Royal Highnesses, The Prince and Princess of Wales, had previously consented to act as Patrons of the exhibition. The Chairman also announced the receipt of the following subscriptions to the Guarantee Fund -

Mont £5 5/- and M^r. A. Watt £5. The Sub-committee presented their Report in the following terms. -

Report of Sub-committee

The Sub-committee appointed to submit suggestions with regard to the form and scope of the Loan exhibition proposed to be held in 1904 in celebration of the Three Hundredth Anniversary of the granting of King James the First's Charter to the Muscovy Company, have the honor to report as follows:-

The size of the hall that can be obtained and particularly the facilities for hanging pictures or placing them on screens will determine to a great extent the size and scope of the exhibition. It is most desirable that the Hall should be lit by daylight, and not, as was the case in the Victoria Loan

Exhibition by artificial light only

Though the exhibition is primarily designed to illustrate the progress of music during the last three centuries of the company's existence, it should not be too rigidly restricted in point of date or nationality, unless the consideration of the space available should make such restriction necessary.

The exhibition should include Musical Instruments, Autograph Manuscripts, Printed Music, Portraits and Personal Memorials of distinguished musicians; exhibits relating to any one musician should as far as possible, be grouped together.

An interview should be made to obtain the permission of His Majesty the King for the loan of some of the valuable manuscripts preserved at Buckingham Palace, and we think that exhibits illustrating formation music, and in general the connection of Royalty with music would prove of much public interest.

English instruments of the seventeenth and eighteenth centuries should be made a special feature, as stringed instruments of these centuries and particularly of the former, are the equals of much of the finest contemporary work of the continent.

Original additions of early music, such, for example, as the Madrigals that were written in England during the golden period of English music, should be sought out and exhibited. It is desirable that the exhibition should have special and distinctive features and as examples of what may be done in this direction we suggest:-

- (a) That eminent organ builders should be asked to exhibit a series of organ pipes showing their historical development.
- (b) That Music Printers and Publishers be asked to contribute an exhibit illustrating present and past processes of music printing and engraving.
- (c) That the formation of a series of portraits should be invited at, as for example of the Organists of Westminster Abbey and St Paul's Cathedral, of Professors of Music

in our Universities or of Masters of the King's Music.

All objects sent would have to be insured for the value their owners put upon them, expenses of carriage paid, and their keeping and return guaranteed.

It is essential that the glass cases employed should be absolute airtight, and we would strongly advise that cases such as those in use at South Kensington Annex which long experience has found most suitable, should be hired.

It is very desirable that everything should be well and correctly labelled and that a catalogue should be published.

If a good and comprehensive collection be formed, we believe that the company would be well repaid by the publication of a Catalogue de luxe containing photographs of some of the important objects shown. Such a record of the exhibition would be a fitting memorial of an important work carried out by the company.

Finally, if there should be sufficient space, we would suggest that musical performances should be given illustrating English music of various periods, and making use of some of the instruments exhibited. At South Kensington in 1875 concerts of music were given on antique instruments by players many of whom came from abroad for the purpose, but we do not think this would be necessary now. We hope this idea will be taken into consideration. If the music were to be given in the hall where the exhibits are shown the question of seating the audience would have to be carefully considered, it might be advisable to obtain the use of a smaller room for the express purpose of musical performances, and giving brief descriptive lectures in the history of the various types of instrument shown and the music performed.

The Report being considered in detail, the Chairman explained the steps he had taken to secure the loan of a suitable Livery Hall, and the difficulty encountered in endeavouring to obtain one for a period of 21 days during the summer of 1904. Several Halls visited were unsuitable for want of light, and not one had yet been found where pictures would be permitted to be hung on the walls. It was resolved to appoint the following as a special Deputation to visit and report upon a suitable Hall. The Master, The Chairman of the Committee, Sir Frederick Bridge, Sir George Martin, Mr. G. Cooper and Mr. A. F. Hill. The Report of the Sub-committee having been adopted for recommendation to your Honorable Court, the following additional suggestions were made - that early Church Music as well as Madrigals should be sought after, that His Majesty the King be asked to honor the Company by exhibiting the Company's Gold Medal presented to him when Prince of Wales and some of the valuable Manuscripts, together with Handel's Harpsichord now at Buckingham Palace, that James Mella Walker and Mr. A. G. Hill

be approached to exhibit some old specimens of organ pipes; that amongst the series of portraits to be exhibited those of the Gresham Professors of Music be included and that the loan of some of the Portraits of Musicians at present now in the University Schools be sought; that musical performances should be given in connection with the exhibition; that the catalogue of the exhibition should include a limited number of advertisements, and be illustrated, if possible; that application should be made for the loan of some of the Manuscripts of Westminster Abbey, which included an autograph letter of Orlando Gibbons, Father Smith's Agreement to add 4 stops to the Abbey Organ with Purcell's annotation, and other interesting Musical Manuscripts.

We desire to record our sincere thanks to the Sub-committee for their valuable assistance.

In conclusion, we have to report the receipt of the following additional contributions to the guarantee Fund - The Immediate Past Master, Mr Charles Dennis Heblyn £10 10/- Mr Robert Bilton Warwick £20 and Colonel Thomas Bradney Shaw-Hether £10, and that Mr Otto Goldschmidt, Dr Walter Paratt, Dr Cummings, Mr John Testepe and the Rev^d Mr Galpin have most kindly consented to lend many interesting Manuscripts, Autographs and Portraits.
