The Master handed His Majesty the Gold Medal enclosed in a case of blue velvet incised as above together with a copy of the resolution engrossed on vellum and surmounted by the Arms of the Company respectfully requesting His Majesty to honor the Company by accepting the Medal and stated that a similar Medal had been presented to His Majesty's father King Edward the VII when Prince of Wales, on the 19th July 1873.

The King made a gracious reply and expressed his best wishes for the continued progress of the Company. He then cordially shook hands with the Master and the other members of the deputation and after some conversation about music generally, the deputation withdrew.

Accounts

The Treasurer presented his accounts for 1919 which had been duly audited by P. H. Major A. G. Chamier and W. A. G. Hunter. He reminded the Court that this was the first yearly statement of accounts, since Peace had been ratified and stated that the accounts showed the Company was £400 richer at the end of the year. He put down necessary administration expenses at £250, which left the Treasurer only about £150 per annum to deal with but, said he had been able to invest more than ^{two} ~~one~~ third of the sum received, as directed by the Minutes through the liberality of certain members of the Court. On the proposition of P. H. Sir Homewood Crawford, seconded by the Deputy Master a cordial vote of thanks was given to the Treasurer for his services. A copy of the accounts appears on the next page.
